JOHN ALGEO and ADELE ALGEO were fellow students in Thomas Pyles's *Beowulf* class many years ago, and Tom and Becky Pyles stood as godparents for the elder Algeo child (another Tom). So the Pyles-Algeo association in both longstanding and onomastic. More recently, the Algeos have contributed to the third edition of Pyles's *Origins and Development of the English Language* and to a collection of Pyles's articles: *Thomas Pyles: Selected Essays on English Usage*.

EMERSON BROWN, JR. teaches at Vanderbilt University and in 1982–1983 was a Visiting Fellow at Cornell's Society for the Humanities. He has published articles and reviews in the Chaucer Review, Neuphilologische Mitteilungen, Dante Studies, Viator, Studies in Philology, Southern Humanities Review, Chaucer Newsletter, Studies in the Age of Chaucer, Romance Philology, Philological Quarterly, Traditio, Anglia, and Journal of English and Germanic Philology. His current project is a study of Epicurus in thought and literature from Cicero to Chaucer, and he would be delighted to hear of interesting uses of the name Epicurus — in any language and from any period.

PHILIP C. KOLIN, Associate Professor of English at the University of Southern Mississippi, was a student of Thomas Pyles at Northwestern University. The Co-Editor of Mississippi Folklore Register, he has published five books — Elizabethan Stage Doctor as a Dramatic Convention (1975), Professional Writing for Nurses in Education, Practice, and Research (1980), Successful Writing at Work (1982), Shakespeare in the South: Essays on Performance (1983), and a technical writing textbook to be released later this year (1983) by St. Martin's Press. He has also published more than fifty articles on onomastics, linguistics, Renaissance and modern drama, and folklore.

GRADY MCWHINEY and FORREST MCDONALD are professors of history and distinguished senior fellows of the Center for the Study of Southern History and Culture at the University of Alabama, and are the authors of numerous books and articles. McWhiney's most recent book, co-authored with Perry D. Jamieson, is Attack and Die: Civil War Military Tactics and the Southern Heritage (1982); McDonald's is A Constitutional History of the United States (1982). Together McWhiney and McDonald have written several articles on the South's Celtic heritage and are completing a book on the subject.

OVID VICKERS teaches English at East Central Junior College, Decatur, Mississippi, a position he has held since 1955. He holds degrees from George Peabody College (B. A. and Ed. D.) and the M. A. from Vanderbilt University. He serves as Secretary-Treasurer of the Mississippi Folklore Society, and holds the Award of Merit presented by the Mississippi Historical Society for his work done in Mississippi folklore.

The reviewers are familiar to readers of *Names*: ELSDON C. SMITH, a founder of the Society, twice its president, and for many years the Book Review Editor and Attorney; ROBERT M. RENNICK, author of many important articles on personal names and author of the forthcoming book on Kentucky place names; J. B. RUDNYĆKYJ, a former president, founder of the Canadian Society of the Study of Names, and author of more than 1,000 articles, books, and reviews on names; W. F. H. NICOLAISEN, a former president, currently President of the American Folklore Society, and author of many books and articles pertaining to onomastics, theory of naming, and folklore; and KELSIE B. HARDER, a former president. Harder was also a student of Thomas Pyles, who

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suggested to Harder that he submit his graduate seminar paper, "The Names of Thomas Dekker's Devils," to the then new magazine, *Names*. It appeared in Volume III (1955).

ROBERT BOENIG teaches English in the Pennsylvania State University system. GERALD LEONARD COHEN teaches in the Department of Humanities at the University of Missouri at Rolla. He is Editor of the sparkling and often provocative *Notes on Etymology*.
