## Errata

I. L. Allen reports etymological errors in his article "Some Informal Neighborhood and Street Names in Manhattan," which appeared in the December, 1993 issue of Names. The coinage and popularization of Fun City should have been attributed to columnist Dick Schaap in 1966 and not to a promotion of Mayor John Lindsay's administration at that time (see Gerald Leonard Cohen. Origin of New York City's Nickname 'The Big Apple'. Frankfurt am Main: Peter Lang, 1991, pp. 70-72). Orange Juice Gulch for Times Square was restricted to theatrical slang. Jewish Alps was first and most popularly applied to the Catskills resort area and only later (and perhaps rarely) to Morningside Heights.

In the December, 1994 issue, the "Works Cited" section of Abraham Stahl's article incorrectly credited several publications to David Rabi rather than to Professor Stahl. *Names* regrets the error; the corrected references follow.
