Wolfgang Ahrens is an Associate Professor of German at York University, Toronto, Canada. He has been Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Society for the Study of Names (1988-1994) and editor of *Onomastica Canadiana* since 1994. He is a keen traveler in the Caribbean and in a similar vein to the present article, he published (with Sheila Embleton) "Toponymy, Language and Spontaneous Naming in Aruba, Bonaire and Curaçao" *Onomastica Canadiana*, June 1987, 32-40.

Sheila Embleton is a Professor of Linguistics, York University, Toronto, Canada. She is currently Past President of both the Canadian Society for the Study of Names and the American Name Society. Her main areas of scholarly interest, other than onomastics, are historical linguistics, sociolinguistics, dialectology, and statistical applications in linguistics.

John Algeo, past president of the American Name Society and the American Dialect Society, is Professor *Emeritus* at the University of Georgia. He is currently editing volume 6 of the *Cambridge History of the English Language*, on English in North America and is working on a dictionary of Briticisms based on the collections of Allen Walker Read, supplemented by citations he and his wife, Adele Algeo, have collected.

Leonard R.N. Ashley, is Professor *Emeritus*, Brooklyn College of The City of New York. He has twice been President of the American Name Society and has served since the seventies on the executive council of ANS and on the editorial board of *Names: A Journal of Onomastics*. He is author of several dozen books ranging from literature and linguistics (including *What's in a Name?*) to military history and popular culture.

Henri Dorion studied law and geography at Laval (Québec) and Ottawa Universities. He has been a Researcher in Residence at the Polish Academy of Sciences (Warsaw), USSR Academy of Sciences (Moscow), and Strasbourg University. He has served as President of the Commission de toponymie du Québec, the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names and the United Nations Group of Experts on Geographical Names. He is the author of 5 books and over 250 articles on Toponymy, Law, Political Geography, Museology and Music.

Frank R. Hamlin is an *Emeritus* Professor of French at the University of British Columbia. His principal onomastic publications relate to the toponymy of Languedoc in southern France. He is an active member of the Canadian Society for the Study of Names and has reviewed a number of works for *Names: A Journal of Onomastics*.

Kelsie B. Harder, a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor *Emeritus*, has been a member of the American Name Society since 1954. He was President of ANS in 1982 and served as Editor of both the journal *Names* and of the *Ehrensperger Report*.

Robert K. Herbert is Professor and Chair of the Department of Anthropology at the State University of New York at Binghamton. He has long-standing research interests in linguistics and African Studies, with a particular focus on processes of linguistic and cultural change in South Africa and Swaziland. In addition to work in onomastics, he has published on sociolinguistics, literacy, and gender.

Carole A. Hough is a Lecturer in the Department of English Language at the University of Glasgow, Scotland. A council member of the English Place-Name Society and a founder member of the Scottish Place-Name Society, she has published extensively on onomastic and other topics, and is editor of the journal *Nomina*.

Helen Kerfoot is an *Emeritus* Scientist at Natural Resources Canada in Ottawa, Canada. From 1987 to 1998 she was Executive Secretary of the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names. She has written various articles on Canada's toponymy and its administration, and been responsible for the production of an annotated bibliography on the Aboriginal toponymy of Canada. She is currently President of the Canadian Society for the Study of Names and Vice-Chair of the United Nations Group of Experts on Geographical Names.

Donald M. Lance, Professor *Emeritus*, taught in the English Department at the University of Missouri from 1969 to 1994. His publications include articles on Spanish-English bilingualism, American dialectology, and pedagogical linguistics, and he was an editor of *American Pronunciation*, by John. S. Kenyon, 12th ed. enlarged (Ann Arbor: Wahr, 1994). He has been active in the American Name Society, the American Dialect Society, the Missouri Folklore Society, and the Council of Geographic Names Authorities in the United States.

André Lapierre is Professor of Linguistics at the University of Ottawa. He is a past president of the American Name Society and of the Canadian Society for the Study of Names. He is currently Chair of the Advisory Committee on Toponymy Research at the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names.

Michael F. McGoff is Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Administration at the Thomas J. Watson School of Engineering and Applied Sciences at the State University of New York at Binghamton. He completed

his doctoral work in language and onomastics under the guidance of Distinguished Professor W.F.H. Nicolaisen. Dr. McGoff is past editor of *The Ehrensperger Report* and recently published the fifteen year index for *Names: A Journal of Onomastics* (1983 - 1997).

Lucie A. Möller works as chief researcher at the Human Sciences Research Council in Pretoria, South Africa. She is a member of the International Council of Onomastic Sciences, the American Name Society and the Names Society of Southern Africa, of which she is secretary/treasurer and serves on the editorial board. She is the author or co-author of a number of books, articles and reports on names. Dr. Möller serves on the United Nations Group of Experts on Geographical Names (UNGEGN) and has represented South Africa twice.

Alan Rayburn is a geographer who writes and speaks about Canadian toponymy. Most of his career with the Canadian government was served with the secretariat of the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names, of which he was its Executive Secretary from 1973 to 1987. He was president of the Canadian Society for the Study of Names from 1979-82, and president of the American Name Society in 1985.

Grant W. Smith is Professor of English and Coordinator of Humanities at Eastern Washington University. He has recent articles on Shakespeare, the classification of Amerindian placenames, and team names. He is currently chair of The Placename Survey of the United States and President of the American Name Society.
