Smith, the founder of ANS, went beyond the call of duty to sustain the Society in its troublesome first years and to furnish advice to the officers on both its business affairs and its publications for many successful years during his lifetime. For me, it was a great privilege and honor to have worked with him over the years I was actively involved in the work of the Society. I will not name the many others who were supportive and helpful but then they know, they know. Again, congratulations and best wishes for the future.
