**In Memoriam.** The *ANS* regrets the loss of two men who are inseparably connected with modern American culture.

Henry Louis Mencken died in his seventy-sixth year after a long illness. It does not behoove us here to enlarge upon his achievements. Whatever people may think of his literary activities, his name is an important factor in the evolution of American culture of the nineteenth century. In the field of onomatology he was a pioneer, as he was in the field of the American language. He was one of our sponsors when the American Name Society was formed in 1952, and he would have become an active leader in our Society had not his unfortunate illness forced him to curtail his activities.

The other great American whose death we deplore was our member Wheeler Sammons, who became a victim of heart failure in his sixty-seventh year. For several decades he was the publisher and editor of *Who's Who in America*, a reference book without which we can not imagine the American scene. He perfected this reference book to such an extent that it became the model for similar works. As long as *Who's Who in America* will be published the name Sammons will be reverently mentioned in connection with it.



The Society held a successful and encouraging annual Meeting in Chicago on December 28, 1955, in conjunction with the Modern Language Association. The eleven papers on the program were read in two sessions before audiences of forty to fifty persons and were followed by lively discussions. Reports by the president and the treasurer were presented at the business meeting following the first session.

The highlight of the meeting was Allen Walker Read's scholarly and witty address on *The Criticism of Numerical Naming*, at the informal annual dinner attended by about thirty. The president and Professor Rudnycky also reported on the recent International Congress at Salamanca. At the close of the meeting the group requested that the appreciative thanks of the Society be conveyed to Secretary—Editor Gudde for his devoted and efficient services to the Society, and to Mamie Meredith and Elsdon C. Smith for arranging the excellent program and meeting facilities.

*The next annual meeting* will be held December 27 or 28, 1956, at Washington, D. C. The president has appointed Meredith F. Burrill as chairman of the local committee of arrangements and Margaret M. Bryant as chairman of the program committee. Members who wish to read papers or who have suggestions to make should communicate with Professor Bryant, 1 Montague Terrace, Brooklyn 2, N. Y.

*Our Treasurer.*—Henry Karpenstein, charter member No. 1 of the ANS, retired as treasurer of the organization after three years of faithful service.
