Judith P. Saunders is Professor of English at Marist College in New York State. She is the author of *Chinese American Names: Tradition and Transition*, published in 1998 by McFarland & Co. She was born in Seattle, Washington, and grew up in San Francisco's Chinatown where there were many opportunities to observe naming customs of Chinese Americans as well as to note the similarities in thought and naming habits of peoples of different ethnic background.
