# Edwin D. Lawson-Scholar and Gentleman Thomas J. Gasque

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Edwin David Lawson was born in Chicago on December 23, 1923, the son of Abraham and Anna Cooper Levin. In 1951, Ed changed his surname from Levin to Lawson, taking the advice of his academic advisor that, given the attitudes of the time, his Jewish surname might limit his academic career.

When Abraham Levin died in Chicago in 1931, Anna moved the family to Boston, her home city, and Ed attended the public schools. He graduated from Boston Latin School in 1942 and enrolled that year in the University of Illinois, Champaign. World War II was in its first year, and, at the age of 19, Ed joined the Army Reserves. At the end of his freshman year he went on active duty with the Army Air Force, trained as a gunner, and was assigned to B-29 school. In November 1944 his unit, part of the 20th Air Force, went to Saipan, in the Marianas Islands, and began the first bombing runs to mainland Japan since General Jimmy Doolittle's raids. He flew thirty-five missions, and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, and a Purple Heart.

One of Ed's barracks mates was John Ciardi, who would later become famous as a poet and literary critic. In Saipan, his posthumously published diary, Ciardi mentions (November 26, 1944) his discussions with "Levin, [who] I discover, is a philosopher-Freshman year. . . . The discussions stayed wild. Levin's all right. It's myself I'm not sure of. I seem to have a grudge against the motivating force of all philosophy-which seems to reduce everything to a single explanation" (1988, 22). In a later entry (January 5, 1945), Ciardi writes, "A couple of nights ago Levin was on airplane guard when a dive bomber broke through and dropped a buzz bomb (rocket bomb) on the runway. . . . Levin caught a splinter in his heel, luckily just low enough to miss the joint. It did sever a tendon but the report is it can be healed." Ed was in the hospital

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as a result and his crew took off on a raid without him. They did not return (1988, 81).

Ed was discharged in 1946 and returned to the University of Illinois, receiving an A. B. in psychology in 1948. He continued his education there, with an A. M. in 1949, also in psychology; his thesis, *Some Comparisons of Group Performances of Men and Women*, was directed by Raymond B. Cattell. Ed immediately began work on a Ph.D., finishing the degree in 1954. His dissertation was *The Relationship of Change in Attitudes to an Index of Autonomic Disturbance*, directed by Ross Stagner.

Meanwhile, Ed met another psychology student at Illinois, a young woman from Winnipeg, Manitoba, named Irene Kentner. They were married in 1949. They are the parents of three sons-Douglas (deceased), Robert, and David-and they have a grandson and a granddaughter.

Ed's first academic position was at the State University of New York at Albany, where in 1954 he was appointed assistant professor of psychology. He remained there until 1963, and during that time he also did research for the New York State Department of Health and was an abstractor for *Psychological Abstracts*. In 1958, he was certified in New York State as a psychologist. In 1963 he went to Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, as professor of psychology and head of the department. While there he started writing short reviews for *Choice*, which he continued until 2000. In 1966 he moved across the continent to California as professor and head at Stanislaus State College in Turlock. While there he received California certification as a psychologist. In 1967 he returned to New York state, where he remained in the Psychology Department at the State University of New York College at Fredonia until he became professor emeritus in 1989.

While Ed was a graduate student at the University of Illinois, he was influenced by Charles E. Osgood, who developed the Semantic Differential, a device to measure the connotative meaning of concepts by asking respondents to choose a position on a scale between two opposing words, such as "excellent-poor," "powerful-weak," "kind-cruel," and so forth. This concept blends psychology and linguistics, and while Ed's first publications were based on the semantic differential, they were not onomastic. The analysis of names through this technique, however, was a natural progression, though a bit indirect. The director of the computer center at Fredonia mentioned that the center had a programmer but she had nothing to program. Ed thought of several possibilities and realized

that names might be analyzable with the techniques he had been using for other group perceptions (Lawson 2001, 231). He chose men's first names, and the result was an article in the *Journal of Psychology* in 1971. This article caught the eye of *Names* editor Kelsie Harder, who wrote to Ed about the American Name Society, which he joined, and the majority of his onomastics research has since been published in this journal.

Kelsie encouraged Ed to submit articles, review books, and referee manuscripts. He also suggested that Ed guest edit a special issue devoted to the contributions of the social sciences to the study of names. That issue appeared in 1983, with contributions mostly from psychologists and sociologists.

While evaluating manuscripts, Ed noticed that scholars were often unaware of relevant studies, because there had been no published bibliography for over thirty years, since Elsdon Smith's Personal Names in 1952. To correct this deficiency, he began systematically compiling and annotating articles on personal names. His first list was published in two parts in Names in 1984 and 1986. In 1987 he published Personal Names and Naming: An Annotated Bibliography. A second volume, More Names and Naming, appeared in 1995. He has since brought his collections up to date with an extensive bibliography in the 2003 issue of Onoma, the journal of the International Council of Onomastic Sciences (ICOS), and he has also published specialized bibliographies, such as those on nicknames in 1990 and on Jewish names in 1997.

For a long time Ed has had a special interest in names in Israel and neighboring countries. He has visited Israel a number of times, doing research in 1981, 1987, and in the early 1990s. His interest extended to the West Bank during those later years. In 1981 he was a Fulbright Scholar at Yarmouk University in Jordan. In 2003, the Center for the Study of Jewish Onomastics at Bar-Ilan University in Ramat Gan, honored him for his contributions with a special edition of *These Are The Names: Studies in Jewish Onomastics* (Demsky 2003). The issue was timed to recognize Ed on his 80th birthday.

Ed has a special concern for scholarship at an international level; he has fostered and supported a number of academics from non-Western countries, including Russia, China, Nigeria, Zimbabwe, Latvia, Poland, Lithuania, Portugal, West Bank, and, most recently, Azerbaijan; and he has been responsible for bringing to the attention of names researchers everywhere the existence of onomastics journals from around the world.

Preliminary research led to an article in 1992; and in 1993, at the Eighteenth Congress of ICOS, he organized a panel of journal editors to discuss common issues. It was felt to be so successful that similar panels have continued at subsequent meetings of ICOS. His report appeared in *Onoma* in 1997.

One of Ed's most significant contributions to onomastics has been his leadership role in the American Name Society. I first became aware of his influence when I was chosen to be the editor of Names in 1988. His advice, as well as his contributions of articles and reviews, were enormously helpful to me, a relative newcomer to onomastics, and his broad knowledge and understanding helped me to move the journal toward a more international focus. Largely due to his influence, the constitution of ANS was changed to give the president a two-year rather than a one-year term. He was the second two-year president, assuming office at a time that the Society was in trouble financially and organizationally. In the words of Ed Callary, "Lawson took up the reins and, when he left office at the end of 1996, ANS was financially stable, the journal was current and appeared on time, and, probably of greatest importance, the Society had a vision for its members and for onomastics" (2003, 22), including making onomastics more professional and more respected as a discipline, developing resources for the study of names, and encouraging research in previously under-researched areas.

For nearly forty years Edwin D. Lawson has been a leading member of the American Name Society—as scholar, advisor, officer, and friend. It is most fitting and proper that the Society honor him with this special issue of *Names*.
