This new section of *Names* will be devoted to topical and regional bibliographies of literature on names and name research. Such an arrangement appears to be more practical than the attempt to publish regular comprehensive bibliographies covering the entire field. Elsdon C. Smith, eminently fitted for the task, has consented to compile the annual bibliography of personal and of place names published in English. Jack Autrey Dabbs of the Texas A. & M. College will compile at regular intervals the bibliography of names and name research in Latin America. A basic bibliography for this area is appended to his survey article in this issue.
