Fourth International Congress of Onomastic Sciences.—A report of the congress on onomastics, held at Uppsala, Sweden, in August 1952, has been published at København under the editorship of Jöran Sahlgren, Bengt Hasselrot and Lars Hellberg. The first volume contains the program (52 pages), the second volume (432 pages) the reports and lectures. We reproduce herewith the varied topics of the second volume, which may be followed in a later issue by a review of some or all of the lectures presented at Uppsala. It will be noted that several of our European members are represented, while North America is represented only by our charter member, Rudnyckyj. It is to be hoped that Americanists and especially members of the *ANS* will participate in future programs in accordance with the importance of onomatological sciences in America.

Michigan Place Names.—I have been gathering information about the origin of the place names of Michigan and have been at the subject since 1912.

I have published in the *Michigan History Magazine* "The Place Names of Ingham County" complete (208) and have another article

The Everglades.—In issue No. 1, 1953, of *American Speech*, one of our members, E. Wallace McMullen, gives his views concerning the origin of the name *Everglades*. He traces the history of the term and its related variants from the first known reference in 1823 to 1875, and attempts to analyze the formation of the word. His theoretical conclusion on the latter problem is that the term is probably a shortened form of *everlasting glades*, that is, *ever* meaning "endless and perpetual," with the connotation of "weariness or disgust," and *glade* in the sense of "wet glade." McMullen's dissertation, *English Topographic Terms in Florida, 1563-1874*, will be reviewed in a later issue of *Names*.

A New Map of the Americas has been published by the American Geographical Society, Broadway at 156th Street, New York 32, N.Y. Scale, 1:12,500,000 (1 inch = about 200 miles). Size, 34" × 51". 1953.—This general-purpose map has been newly compiled from the most up-to-date sources and is printed in ten colors. Water features are in blue, and elevation zones in green and brown. Cities are classified according to population, and principal railroads and motor roads are shown. The map is based on a specially devised conformal projection which reduces scale and space distortion to a practical minimum.

Four inset maps (1 inch = 1,000 miles) show: Cities and Transport, Agricultural Land Use, Moisture Regions, and Natural Vegetation.—Prices: \$2.50 (folded); \$3.00 (rolled); \$3.50 (waterproof latex paper).
